

## Introduction to Himalayan Anthropology-E2

RAI, Janak

Tribhuvan University (Nepal)



This course is designed as a general introduction to Himalayan anthropology and research topics that have interested scholars of the region over the years. This course introduces ways of understanding the Himalayan region through selected readings from anthropology, history, geography, and other disciplines. In particular, the course will focus on understanding the relations between ecology, cultural and ethnic diversity, and subsistence-based ways of life in the region. In the course, we will closely examine the major social, economic, political, and ecological transformations that the region has undergone in recent decades to broaden our understanding of how the people and communities in the Himalayan region remake and continue their traditional ways of life by resisting and appropriating the forces of the state, modernity, and globalization. We will use ethnographic texts, videos and other materials to understand the people, culture, and histories of the Himalayan region. Lectures, discussions, and presentations will be the general format of the course. The course materials will focus largely on Nepal, but students with interests in other Himalayan countries and regions will have an opportunity to explore their interests through additional reading assignments.

## The Energy Transformation in the EU and Japan-E2

Students from all fields of study are welcome. The course will make a comparison of the energy transformation in the EU and Japan. The focus will be on the economic benefits of decarbonization of the power generators and consumers, integrating storage solutions and the redesign of the grid infrastructure. The students will navigate the complexities of transitioning from traditional fossil fuels to renewable energy sources, including solar, wind, hydro, and bioenergy. The role of technological advancements and digital tools in optimizing these energy sources will form a core part of the course. The course also addresses the challenges and opportunities in smart grid technologies, digitalization of energy systems, and the integration of e-Mobility charging infrastructure for real-time energy management.

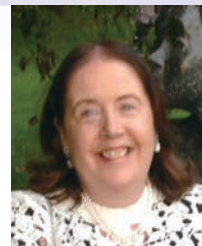

## Global Englishes of the Past and Present-E2

This intensive course will examine the origins, development and characteristics of the English Language within Great Britain and globally as a language of colonisation. Important themes which the teaching and learning will address include: (1) Key changes in English from the Anglo-Saxon period to the present day (e.g. the Great Vowel Shift); (2) English in language contact situations within the British Isles and further afield (e.g. contact with Celtic, Romance, Scandinavian languages); (3) The Spread of Innovations; (4) Language Attitudes and Social Justice.
